


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## Adjective and adverb phrase worksheet with answers 3rd level 6th graders

Thank you very much for your cooperation. It is important to remember that a phrase is a group of words that does not contain a subject and a verb. The clause can modify or describe verbs, adverbs, and adjectives. M.A. English Examples of Adverbs in Sentences Adverbs can mystify writers because they have a number of different functions within the English language. For example: I parked the car where I could easily find it later. In its entirety, it modifies the verb "parked" to describe where the car is located. Thank you for your participation! When you look at the adverb phrase examples above, you'll see that "right here under the bridge" does not contain a verb, so it is just a long phrase. This adverbial has both a subject ("I") and a verb ("find"), so it is a clause. Consider the following sentences: I parked the car. I parked the car here. I parked the car right here under the bridge. The Storm (Poem) Stanley becomes quite frightened when a storm howls eerily outside his window. An adverb clause, on the other hand, is a group of words that does contain a subject and a verb. In general, adverb clauses add information that elaborates on when, where, why, how, how much or under what condition the action in the sentence takes place. Can you find all the adverbs in this fun poem? The first sentence does not contain an adverb or adverb phrase at all. Reviewing examples of adverbs and adverb phrases can help you identify them and use this part of speech effectively. Consider these adverb phrase examples so you'll know what you're looking for: Bob nodded like a bobblehead. Meet me at the mall later this evening. Without thinking, he turned down the road. They must kiss before sunset to break the spell. She went online for more information. In the forest, many creatures snarl and growl. I will not do that, never in a million years! Dad spoke softly to calm her fears. They have a house right by the ocean. She slammed the door in a huff. We will reconvene earlier than usual. Truly happy, I gave him my answer. She took some time off for a much-needed vacation. At every turn, problems blocked his path. I saw a lot of trash beside the highway. He decided to join a gym to get in shape. The dog came in for his bath, incredibly reluctantly. We strolled through the gardens very slowly. He made his decision as quickly as possible. Put the flowers by the birdhouse. Jose always arrives sooner than the other students. She flew the plane through the fog calmly and skillfully. So as not to disturb anyone, Michelle tiptoed to bed. The seamstress mended the hem with needle and thread. Sometimes I don't clean under the bed. He performed the tasks without care. Come closer to get a better look. Take this medication as often as needed. The older man recited somewhat hesitantly. Many needs to drive her new car more carefully. To see the view, Harry climbed to the peak. The mystery books were placed next to the crime drama. The line was moving frustratingly slow. The piano coursed around the town square. She takes miles every day. The children opened their presents with delight. This procedure is available in all places. She responded very rudely. You need to wash your hands better. He stood in the driver's spot and lied to me. The second sentence contains the word "here" which describes where the verb phrase occurred. The third sentence contains the adverb phrase "right here". The fourth sentence contains the adverb phrase "right here," which emphasizes where the car was parked and employs a phrase instead of a single adverb. Examples of Adverb Clauses An adverb clause is a group of words that function as an adverb in a sentence. With a couple adverbs by your side, you can add further description, describe an action, or intensify the meaning of another word. A simple adverb phrase usually contains an adverb and at least one other word before or after it, though a prepositional phrase or infinitive phrase can also act as an adverbial. Note that "right here under the bridge" is a prepositional phrase that uses the preposition "under" and the object "bridge." In this case, the prepositional phrase functions as an adverb in the sentence. Just as an adverb can modify a verb, adjective or another adverb, an adverb phrase of more than one word can further describe a verb, adverb, or adjective.

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
